Courses Taught:

American National Government (2010-current)

Course provides students with a basic knowledge of relevant ideas, institutions, and assumptions about the United States government and about American political life.

Introduction to Comparative Politics (2015-current)

This course is an introductory survey of comparative political systems. The purpose of this course is to introduce students to basic political concepts and frameworks and to familiarize them with a variety of international political systems. Students will be introduced to basic methods of Comparative Politics and will develop theoretical and practical skills in comparative analysis.

State and Local Government (2010, 2013-2015)

The course develops student understanding of the relationship between the states and the United States government. Attention is dedicated to the role of elected and appointed officials in state governments and to the ways in which these officials make decisions. The course also features studies on the composition and responsibilities of local governments.

World Regional Geography (2011-2012)

Course provided an overview of the physical forces shaping the planet, and human interactions that influenced human development. Studies emphasized humanity's interactions with and impact upon nature. Special attention was dedicated to the role of international organizations and the role of nation-states in today's international system.

International Relations (Fall 2015)

Course analyzed an overview of the diverse theories used to describe the current International system, and the formation the current events that shape today's international community. Special emphasis is dedicated to various

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theories of economic development and the role of international trade in political development in the Global South.
